What does the Child Care Law Center do?

We *educate* families and child care providers, *advise* advocates and policymakers, provide legal information and referrals, write and sponsor legislation, and *litigate* high-impact cases.

We're currently implementing legislation we sponsored last year, the Keeping Kids Close to Home Act (SB 234) and A Strong Start for CalWORKs Families (SB 321).

- Public benefits
- Housing
- Zoning and land use
